A Message from National President Andrea Niedenthal

I hope everyone is staying warm and encouraging others as we continue to maneuver through these changing times. With change it is important to understand our past and how we built the organization we have today.

This month we are going to highlight the 1960's. Projects that were supported where: the Ball State Teachers College (Summer Boarding Clinic for Speech & Hearing), Indianapolis Speech and Hearing Center (Speech & Hearing Kindergarten), Washington DC Hearing Society, Symphony Endowment Funds, and Hoosier Art Salon. We continued to support scholarships for Indiana University, Purdue Pre-College Institute, Indiana State Teachers College and Ohio State University Summer Clinical Assistantships. In



1964 we started supporting Metropolitan Opera Auditions and in 1967 Riley Hospital Memorial Assn and Western Michigan Orientation Project.

Some interesting history: Mrs. Martha Ivins a founding member of Psi Iota Xi died April 2, 1962, at 105-years old. Since 1955, National Council, on behalf of all Psi Iota Xi chapters, sent fresh flowers to her every two weeks until her death.

In 1967 only 2 ½ years of being a chapter, Zeta Tau Milroy (my own chapter) held the Mid-Year luncheon for 935 members at the Murat Temple in Indianapolis. We were a very young chapter but did a beautiful job of bringing the “Magic of Spring” to Psi Iota Xi. Our radiant rose was in full bloom with the aid of Sigma (Greensburg), Iota (Rushville), Zeta Lambda (Connersville) and Beta Phi (Shelbyville) to transform the Egyptian Room into a breath of Spring. I hope this is encouragement to all chapters, that sometimes you can't do it on your own – collaborate with surrounding chapters as together we can achieve our goals.

In 1968 we opened our National Headquarters at 2020 E 46th Street in Indianapolis. The Honorable Richard Lugar, Mayor of Indianapolis was on hand for the ribbon cutting ceremony.

Indiana School for the Deaf student to sign National Anthem at CFP championship

INDIANAPOLIS — Monday night will mark a moment of pride not only for the winning team of the College Football Playoff National Championship game, but also for a Hoosier family.

Sixth-grader Kaylen Brown will share her gift of sign language before Alabama and Georgia kick off at Lucas Oil Stadium. When you hear the national anthem, there's a universal feeling of pride, but if you ask someone who can't hear, they'll tell you those words still bring about the same feelings of patriotism.

"The flag, and A-S-L always say the red and white stripes," Kaylen said, "When I was growing up signing it, I felt proud, so I want people to feel that." Now Kaylen gets to make sure everyone in the deaf and hard-of-hearing community gets to see and feel the Star-Spangled Banner when she signs the song for the College Football Playoff National Championship game.

"Saying the same things over and over again, you know, I don't miss a beat," she said. The NCAA's committee chose Kaylen out of 15 students from Indiana School for the Deaf. They all submitted videos and principal Andy Alka announced the news when Kaylen won. "We were very excited because we thought Kaylen was just perfect," Alka said. "All of the students were thrilled. They were you know, hooting and hollering for her, and she was shocked. She was like 'me,' and we said 'yes, you were picked.'"

Kaylen will join singer Natalie Grant on the field of Lucas Oil Stadium. Together, Grant will sing and Kaylen will sign the national anthem for 70,000 people in the stands and even more watching from home. "And children when they're looking, when they look at me sign, I want them to look up to me and be hopeful about them maybe being able to sign it when they get older," Kaylen said. Kaylen is only 12 years old, but she shows bravery beyond her age.

"She's a trailblazer at this point, as far as I'm concerned. I want to be like her when I grow up," said her mother, Roshanta Burns. She told us that she knows her daughter's melodic hand movements represent the language of approximately 500,000 Americans who rely on ASL.


"I do believe with her doing this, it will open up a lot of eyes and may actually open a lot of programs at other schools in other places so that everybody is included, and nobody feels left out," Burns said.

Kaylen's moment on the field will remind everyone about the resilience in American history and her movements take no sound to bring tears to her mother's eyes and show gratitude for all Hoosiers.

Kaylen is an impressive young lady. She's also a cheerleader, basketball player, and possibly wants to become a veterinarian. We'll sure be watching her as the big game kicks off tonight at 8 p.m.



Hoosier Art Salon Paintings



The members of Iota Rho, Odon, Indiana were presented the Hoosier Art Salon painting which they won in a drawing at the 2009 National Convention – Seasons of Sharing entitled, "Morning Pages" by Susan Mauck.

Artist Susan Mauck describes her artwork as "impressionistic, with a contemporary edge". Her passion for portraiture and figure painting is evident as she strives to capture a moment in time that is sure to become a treasured heirloom.

She grew up in the small Southern Indiana town of Odon. Odon was a bit like the TV show Mayberry. She couldn't wait to move to a big city. But, in retrospect, it

was a wonderful place to grow up. It was the late 1950's and early 1960's and life was simpler. From childhood...she just always knew. She didn't have many toys and was an only child. Susan remembers spending hours drawing and designing my own "paper doll" clothes. She was that student the teachers always asked to "make a poster" or create something for the bulletin board. Later, it was class play backdrops and "prom" decorations. She was always the "creative" one. As a child, one of her biggest fans was the "preacher's wife". We went to church "a lot" and during the Sunday night services Mrs. Webb would slip me paper to draw the people in the congregation. They were tiny portraits. People were fascinated and always wanted to see whom she had drawn that night. Looking back, she believes that is where her love of "portraiture" truly began.

After receiving an art degree from Indiana University, Susan continued her education through several workshops and seminars, including well-known artists Richard Schmid, Carolyn Anderson, Ken Auster, Debra Huse, and Kim English. Mauck is an exhibitor and member of Hoosier Salon, Indiana Heritage, IAC, IPAPA, and Carmel Arts & Design Gallery Association. She was awarded "Best Portrait" in the 2010 Hoosier Salon and is in the permanent collection of the Indiana State Museum.

Susan Mauck recently opened French Bleu Fine Art Gallery located in the Carmel Arts & Design District. Her work may be seen during gallery hours and by appointment. Classes and art consultation are also available.

Greetings from the Northeast District! We are currently anticipating a major winter storm in the cold, cruel north, but the warm hearts of our sister Psi Otes continue to take the sting out of these chilly months with their endless generosity. I'd like to highlight two projects this month by Alpha Rho, Garrett, and Zeta Theta, Niles. You may have seen these projects if you follow the Psi Iota Xi-Group page on Facebook where chapters can share fundraisers, obituaries, projects and any other PIX-related news with the greater membership.

Alpha Rho chapter in Garrett, IN, supports the Head Start classrooms every school year by providing monthly activity baskets for each classroom. Alpha Rho has supported Head Start for many years, dating back to a member's mom working for the program. Initially the classrooms were in search of volunteers to read to the children. As schedules filled and members had less time to devote to reading in the classroom, the idea to provide book baskets was born. The project has evolved over the years, but in its current format, a basket filled with activities and other useful items is presented to the child in each class that has read the most books at home that month. The baskets typically contain an activity or coloring book with crayons, a story book, a stuffed animal, and/or a small toy. They might also contain such necessities as a toothbrush and toothpaste, socks, a winter hat, or mittens/gloves depending on the season or holiday theme that month. Alpha Rho budgets each year for some items, but most of the items are donated by the members themselves. Head Start staff reports that the children look forward to the baskets every month. Chapter president Jan Merrill sent a picture of the Valentine's Day-themed February baskets that she was getting ready to drop off. Also pictured are the December and January baskets.

Zeta Theta chapter in Niles, MI, began a new project this year to provide activity bags for children who come to the emergency room. As described by chapter president Tricia Bookout, longtime member Joni Flynn works in the emergency department at Lakeland Hospital in Niles and "sees many children who have unfortunately been affected by mental health issues due to our current medical situation nationwide." The chapter members were moved to brainstorm a way to cheer up the children to make their stay a little easier. Christine Konkey donated material she had been saving for many years, Lesley Bookout donated money towards additional material for the bag handles, and Sue Counts donated

her time sewing all the bags. The chapter used project funds for purchasing the items to fill the bags – coloring books, crayons, pencils, packet of Kleenex, stickers, bookmarks, and a pad of paper to draw on. In all, 50 bags were sewn, filled, and presented to the hospital. While this is the first time Zeta Theta has done this project, there are future plans to replenish the bags as they run low. In the accompanying picture, Sue Counts presents one of the finished bags to Joni Flynn at the hospital.

125 years of service, and we keep finding new ways to bring cheer to those less fortunate and enrich the lives of others. Great work, Alpha Rho and Zeta Theta!

HOST A MEMBERSHIP DRIVE *(previously submitted by Mickie Hansen, 2018)*

Ladies, when you love being part of an organization like Psi Iota Xi, why not share your experiences and invite other women to be a part of it? Hosting a membership drive focuses on inviting potential members to an event that you have planned just for them. Pick a date about 3-4 months from now. Select 3-4 ladies who are positive and committed to making your chapter grow in membership to host the event. Choose a location and time for the event to take place.

Pick a theme, that's right, themes can be fun and will help draw the attention of a potential new member to your open house. Here are a few examples: "What's the scoop with PIX" and serve ice cream, "A Minion reasons to join Psi Iota Xi" and everyone dresses like a minion, or "Help PIX Grow" and give a small flower to each potential new member. Start your list of who to invite. Consider past scholarship recipients and their mothers, speech and hearing clinicians or school teachers. Pat graduated from Peru High School in 1949. Most of her working years were spent as an administrative assistant in the accounting profession. She worked for Zaremski Accounting and then for Thomas A. Kirk & Associates until her retirement. Although never formally educated after high school, Pat was a natural learner and educated herself on numerous topics.



She was once active in the PTA and served on the Miami County YMCA Board of Directors. She helped to create, and then participated in, the Women's and the Couples' Volleyball Leagues at the Miami County YMCA. She was an active member of Psi Iota Xi philanthropic sorority for over 50 years and served as the organization's president in the early 1980's. Pat was also a member of First Christian Church where she spent over 60 years serving the Lord. Living in Miami County all her life, Pat made many lasting friendships. She was known for her keen sense of fashion, and no matter the occasion, was always put-together and looking sharp. In her earlier years with her first husband and only daughter, Terrie Ann, she enjoyed time at Lukens Lake and Mississinewa Reservoir with a host of friends. In her later years, she enjoyed wintering in Florida with her

second husband. Her grandchildren and great-grandchildren held a special place in her heart, and she loved them dearly. A few of her various hobbies included auctioning, antiquing, oil painting, crosswording, reading, and gardening. She wasted nothing, repurposed everything, and respected the value of a dollar. In her most recent years, she enjoyed working outside in her yard and talking with those neighbors who walked, jogged, or rode bicycles past her house.

Pat was blessed with excellent health most of her life until falling ill in August of 2021. True to character, she fought to stay in the home she loved, but in December, she moved to Blair Ridge where her family commemorated her 90th birthday with her just last week.

Survivors include her beloved and devoted daughter, Terrie Beasey Hanson, and son-in-law, Bill Hanson, of Peru. Together, Terrie and Bill grew to be Pat's everything. Her stepdaughter, Denise Hamman Yater (Tracy) of Peru; grandson, Derek Hanson of Peru; and granddaughter, Tricia Hanson Anderson (Kip) of Westfield; great-grandchildren Gavin and Alivia Hanson, Matt and Kate Harrison and Hailey Anderson. Surviving siblings include her sisters Janet Kay Montgomery and Marilyn (Jim) Allen, both of Peru, and her "baby" brother Larry Garbert of Florida, who visited her often. Her siblings gave her several special nieces and nephews. In addition to her parents and first and second husbands, Pat was preceded in death by her brother, Joseph Garbert, and her sister, Jayne Lutz.
