

## Psi Iota Xi

Zeta Xi, Madison, Indiana, was installed as the 101<sup>st</sup> chapter of Psi Iota Xi, in a candlelight ceremony on March 20, 1960. The nineteen charter members set a standard of determination, philanthropy, and engagement in the Madison community as Psi Otes. Zeta Xi is grateful to the sisters of Alpha Omega, North Vernon, Indiana, who supported the organization of the new chapter in Madison.

Our first major fund raiser was a local Thrift Shop which was active from 1960 to 1983. Our cheese ball fundraiser began in 1984 and continues today as our popular cheese-spread. Other fundraisers have included charity ball/dances, two original cookbooks, yard sales, bunny breakfast events, card parties, and bridge groups.

In 1987 we were the recipients of a generous monetary donation from our local newspaper Society Editor, Pat Oyler. She was impressed with the projects we supported in the community and gave us the means to continue our work. We created the Pat Oyler Scholarship fund in her honor. This fund focuses on speech, hearing, community involvement, and

scholarships. It has been successfully managed and will continue to grow, leaving a legacy for the future.

Supporting art, literature, music, speech and hearing, and other charitable causes have taken many forms over the past 65 years. We have supported the Summer Speech and Hearing Clinic since 1965. Other projects we have sponsored are "Story Hour" for young children, music clinics, scholarships, Hoosier Art Salon traveling exhibits, Christmas gift shops, graduation parties for GED/GRE graduates, and providing art supplies to the library. We have been able to purchase musical instruments, communication boards, and hearing devices to help individuals and groups in our community. We have also funded the purchase of microphones for local community and high school theater groups. Donations have been made by Zeta Xi to the local hospital and oncology center, and many other worthwhile charitable organizations in our community. Zeta Xi members have also consistently given the gift of time in support of our community and those in need.

Alice Rogers served on the Indiana State Board for several years becoming Indiana Association President in 2006. She was followed by Shirley Herrick who served on the Indiana State board becoming President in 2020.

Zeta Xi sisters love to have fun and truly like spending time together! Over the years we have embraced and balanced work and play. Regular convention attendance has been a priority over the past six decades. Our sisters have participated in skits, written parody songs to perform, and hosted a Welcome Party when our sponsoring chapter Alpha Omega hosted convention. We have had game nights, book clubs, outdoor movie sing along nights, art projects, pool parties, and pitch ins, to name a few of our reasons to get together. In 2024, we welcomed two new, at large auxiliary members, from Kentucky into Zeta Xi.

Many things have changed over the last 65 years, but the dedication of our members working together, and the bonds of friendship over the decades has been consistent in the name of Psi Iota Xi.

The 122nd Convention of Psi Iota Xi was held June 28-29, 2025, at the Sheraton Hotel at Keystone Crossing, Indianapolis, Indiana. Registration for this convention was 349. Upsilon, Greenfield, Indiana was the host chapter.





### Sandie Carlson's introductory speech of Taffy Day at the 2025 National Convention:

## **Taffy Day's speech following her installation as National President at the 2025 National Convention:**
